As we continue these classes, it seems we are always tweaking and trying new things in order to role model how to live in the Kingdom. The students were initially quite opposed to participating in some of the practical outreaches we do here. However, the excitement was almost palpable as they experienced the community in life groups and prayed for hurting and lonely people laying in hospital beds.

The small Bible school program we get to run here is less about training "pastors" than it is teaching men to live a life devoted to following and obeying Jesus in all aspects of life. These men come from many different walks of life, tribes and even different denominations. The group includes farmers, a policeman, teachers, students, Baptist, Anglican, Church of Christ, married, single, engaged and so on. We are so thankful to work with these students. We pray that God will raise up some of these guys to 'go' not only to their own people but to people and tribes who have not heard about Jesus yet.

After five years of planting and watering God's word, several people confessed their faith in Christ and plans were made for a river baptism. We'd need to dam up the river to provide a pool for immersion.

During the previous evening though, locals began to say that if there was a baptism, the river spirits would be angry and the stream would dry up. Others said that since evil spirits come and go from the underworld through creek beds that it would invite trouble to enter the water. Many countryside people do not bathe or swim in the rivers because of this belief. Consequently, people began to back out of their decision to be baptized.

Our team stayed down at the river and prayed while the spiritual battle raged in the village. Then we heard that everyone was going to a meeting at the headman's house to decide what to do. While we were praying, we looked up and over the hill the people started to come and quietly sat down. After reading some scripture, we asked who was ready to follow Jesus. One by one FIVE stepped into the river, each one confessing Jesus as Lord and testifying that they had no other gods or idols in their hearts or in their homes! Later, 28 more came to faith!
